Nameday's Stephanie Newman explains, "The last few years have been tough, and things still aren't back to normal. So any reason to connect and celebrate with those close to us should be embraced.

"We all love a birthday, but a nameday is different. Your birthday is arbitrary and simply marks how long you have been alive. Whereas your name was given to you by someone who loves you, it is tightly bound with your sense of identity. It is a reminder of your relationships, with names sometimes being passed down through generations instead of a random marker of age," Newman says.

"So, we set out to create a platform, consisting of a website and apps, that helps people discover when it's their nameday and those of the people



they care about. We've tried to keep it simple, so we have a calendar with ten of the more common names

each day, with less common names in the extended calendar. You can also learn about the origins and meanings of the names, search for your friends, and so on."

Newman adds, "The great thing about namedays is that you don't need to remember birthdays or other specific dates. In Finland, for example, they even have a national almanac which lists namedays for people. It is a fun and inclusive tradition already celebrated in many countries, and we want to make it more popular elsewhere."

In countries like Finland, Poland, and Latvia, namedays are as important as birthdays. However, they are celebrated differently - with drinks and dinner being popular in one nation or gifts and sweets in another. As with all traditions, they change and adapt. The main point is to have another reason to celebrate relationships and come together. We all need that, now more than ever.
